Community Services LIHEAP







When I was first introduced to TL I was working on completing IAR's for all of the Head Start/ Early Head Start families for Back to School Fair Registration. TL is a single mother of 2 girls under the age of 5. I was able to register her children for the school fair and they were able to receive school supplies, socks, & undies at the event.

TL was very intelligent, and she seemed to be very driven in terms of parenting and caring for her children. At this time, I let her know that if she had any interest in furthering her education or needing assistance seeking employment that I would be more than happy to work with her. In June of 2024, one of the Early Head Start teachers approached me and asked if I would be able to enroll TL in Family Support as she had been talking about going back to school-TL had told the EHS Teacher that I had mentioned the program in the past. I reached out and asked TL to sit down and talk to me about what she is planning on doing and what goals she had for employment or education. She stated that she really wanted to go to nursing school, as it was a dream of hers to be a nurse just like her mother. She wasn't sure how that would be possible with everyday expenses such as food, gas, tuition cost, and her other bills. As a single parent she had to ensure that her children would be cared for and that she could maintain her home while she attended the program. TL was able to utilize Early Head Start / Head Start services for her children, ensuring that they would have appropriate care for her to attend school and work on her goals. It was a huge relief to have child care that she was confident in. TL was accepted into the TCTC Nursing Program and her biggest concern was how to pay for the program. I talked to TL about options for financial assistance like LIHEAP, ECIP, and other resources in Dent County that could help her pay for these things while she was in school. I referred TL to Rolla Employment Services (Career Center) so that she would be able to get tuition assistance. The nursing program is \$23,000 and even after receiving the full PELL Grant, TL would still have to pay well over \$800 per month to cover the cost of the program. Through the Career Center, TL was able to receive WIOA funding to pay the remaining cost of the programs. She was also able to receive assistance with other costs like a new lap top and fuel for her drive back and forth to nursing school through the SkillUp program and COPIC. TL just took her Mid-Term finals this week and we are happy to report that she is passing all of her courses and she is well on her way to obtaining her LPN license and working her dream job while making a salary that will allow her to provide for her family.

TL plans on enrolling in SCMCAA's Family Support Program for the 2025 FY and utilizing SkillUp offered by the agency braided with services offered through the Career Center. We will be working together to achieve her dream!

Head Start Early Head Start





How has Head Start impacted my life? A question that I have been asked 3 times in my life. Each time was during an interview for a job position for South Central Missouri Community Action Agency, and each time the answer came with a lot of heart felt response and resulted in tears. Where I am today is because of the hospitality that I was shown as a parent in 2018 when I first enrolled my youngest daughter into the Early Head Start infant room. I was in the last years of a 15-year abusive marriage, had four children, and was struggling to keep a roof over our heads. My now ex-husband had wandered off the beaten path and was lost to drugs and many other harmful choices along the way. I had just had my youngest daughter and was waiting tables at a local restaurant that was suffering at the expense of the economy.

The restaurant closed down leaving many without work, including me, but I still had to provide for my family. I had heard about Head Start and walked to the local center where I did the application for my youngest. At this time, I was unemployed, had no means of transportation, and was being evicted. When I did the application for Head Start the Site Supervisor asked me questions about my life, living situations and household accommodations. It was heart breaking to explain how we struggled to eat and often didn't have basic necessities because of the poor choices that my ex had made. After unloading my story and waiting for the judgement, I was instead met with kindness and compassion. I was offered 3 meals a day for my children and me at the Head Start. They advocated on my family's behalf to help get me in contact with other community resources, including the SCMCAA CSBG program which helped me with my utilities.

We ended up evicted and had to move to Poplar Bluff where we were transferred to the Poplar Bluff Head Start. We had been put into an apartment and thought that life was back on track, but we were wrong. The living situation got worse, and the landlord refused to fix problems that rendered the apartment unlivable. The home flooded destroying all of our belongings. All of this occurred during COVID. And again, we were without food and without work, but Head Start saw hope in my family and again offered us help. The Family Advocate arranged for meals, diapers, and wipes to be dropped off at my home.

But we were again without a home. This time, there were no options. We were tent bound. At this time, it was just me, a single mother, and 4 kids in a tent. Head Start refused to give up on me. They arranged transportation for my child to and from school and offered me a job. Now partnering with FCC and the domestic violence woman's shelter in Doniphan, my four children and I were put into a home. We were given a second chance.

I started working for the company as a substitute teacher. I loved the children and I loved the staff. After a week, I was encouraged by fellow staff to get my driver's license (I was 30 and never had a license). I was ashamed but I knew I could do it, and I did. I was then encouraged to further my education. I felt empowered. I had an amazing support system and work family to help guide me. I enrolled in college classes at TRCC and began to pursue early childhood education and earned my CDA. I was then offered a position as a T2. This was a blessing to be considered valuable enough to want to promote as a teacher. I then worked my way up to a T1 after a year. But I didn't want to stop there. I loved the families. I loved the children, and I loved the impact that they had made on my life. I wanted to give back to them and to others who needed someone to see the potential in them. So, I chose to further my career as Wayne County's new Home Visitor with the MIECHV program.

Head Start saw potential in me and advocated for me and my family. I owe where I am today to the many men and woman who work for Head Start and advocated on my behalf.



After all weatherization services were installed, new windows, weatherstripping and installing sweeps on the doors, replacing the older furnace and air conditioner systems with new energy efficient systems and installing new insulated duct work, the air reduction was 40%.

WEATHERIZATION

HEATING SYSTEMS

26

The heating systems in 26 of the 32 weatherized homes were upgraded. Of those 26 homes, 18 had electric heat pumps installed, 7 propane and 1 natural gas. 32 families received Weatherization services with an average cost per home of \$17,517.53. 15 families were elderly, 13 were disabled. Funding was split between six grants

MO HOUSING TRUST FUND

8 homes received MHTF home repair services. The average cost per home was \$9,015.43. 6 people were elderly and 4 were disabled.

HOME REPAIR OPPORTUNTITY PROGRAM

SkillUP Employment and Training Program

Success Story: A Journey to Sustainable Employment

Background: At just 23 years old, our customer has faced significant challenges. raised by their elderly grandmother, who is now in ill health, they have lived independently since they were sixteen years old. Despite minimal family support, they graduated high school and secured a parttime job as a dishwasher in a nursing home near their subsidized apartment.

Referral and Enrollment: SkillUP developed an objective and comprehensive assessment to determine their employment and training needs. The SkillUP case manager referred them to the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) and the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP). They were dually enrolled in Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) SkillUP and CSBG services to help them gain the necessary employment skills for more sustainable work.





Educational Aspiration: Although they had a high school diploma, the customer stated they would like to further their education, The SCMCAA Crisis Support Coordinator, conducted a CSBG intake and assessment of their needs. They were provided with information on Pell Grants, as well as online and local colleges available in her area.

Skill Development: The customer identified a lack of employment skills as a barrier to full-time, sustainable employment. SkillUP enrolled them in a subsidized employment program to help them develop job-seeking and job-keeping skills. Upon completing the program, they felt confident enough to apply for local jobs.

Job Search and Employment: With assistance from SkillUP, they created a resume and secured an interview with a local employer. Their preparation paid off, and they were offered a full-time position close to their home. The customer is making \$14.50 per hour with full benefits.

Supportive Services: Understanding the importance of proper attire for their new office job, SkillUP provided supportive services to purchase the necessary clothing. CSBG also assisted in ordering versatile clothing items that could be mixed and matched to create multiple outfits.

Outcome: Through determination and the support of SkillUP and partner programs, our customer successfully transitioned from part-time work to a full-time position. They now have the stability and confidence to pursue their career goals and further their education. This story is a testament to the power of SCMCAA staff working together to braid services while utilizing local resources with support and the resilience of individuals facing adversity.

MIECHV Early Head Start Home Based Program



I had a family where the grandmother (dad's mother) was caring for her autistic grandson. When she got into the program she was struggling with his behaviors as well with opening doors leading outside and running away. During the time that I had this family they were able to get him into aba therapy as well as speech therapy due to him being nonverbal. During Thanksgiving of 2023 his mother had come to visit with him as she was living in Texas. While she was here visiting the grandmother offered to have her to stay with them so she could build a relationship with her son as well as becoming familiar with his day-to-day routines since he would have multiple appointments a week. Early the following year the mother decided to move in with them. Not long after she was able to get a job at Walmart and also get accepted into nursing school.
